Re: Clark County Council work session on housing code amendments

Clark County Citizens United, Inc. has reviewed the content of the proposed housing options. Missing is any mention of housing options for the rural and resource areas. Are the people who live in those areas, or want to live in those areas, not important? In the Report, they don't exist.

These folks pay a large portion of the property and sales taxes that Clark County uses to conduct business. Does that not matter to the Council? If the councilors believe the wants and needs of these folks don't matter, then why are they charging most of them the highest assessment in property taxes, just because they live on acreage they can't do anything with, to help pay those taxes.

The rural and resource areas have the same housing needs as the urban areas. Currently, there is no relief for them, even though the GMA mandates the county must allow a variety of affordable housing in the rural area. That does not include the urban growth areas.

This council must give these people opportunities for additional housing and jobs. The rural area has only grown .01% in the last five years, and that is not enough to sustain housing needs in that area, for the future. Just as the council is looking for affordable housing options for the homeless people in the urban areas, they have an

obligation and responsibility to assure affordable housing options are available for the homeless people in the rural area.

In addition, the Council has a responsibility to provide job opportunities for all the citizens within the county, which must be reflected in the update of the Comprehensive Plan. Over 90% of the people who live in Battle Ground, Washington, with a 2024 population of 21,928, commute many miles, outside of that area, to get to their jobs. On the other hand, the population of the other cities, particularly Ridgefield, with a 2023 population of 16,720, and others with smaller populations, are getting job opportunities, being encouraged in those areas.

CCCU does expect this Council to rectify the housing and job crisis in the rural and resource areas, with the current update of the Comprehensive Plan. We believe you are well aware that the 1994 rural and resource zoning, that locked up those lands for thirty (30) years, was wrong and illegal. Corrections must be made to all the rural zones, to allow additional housing and job opportunities, outside of the unicorporated urban growth areas.
