Dear Community Planning Staff,

I am writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed zoning and UGA changes in Yacolt, WA, as outlined in Windsor Engineers' recent letter. As a family farm owner on the same road, less than a mile from the proposed development area, I am deeply concerned about the potential negative impacts this change will have on our community, environment, and way of life.

The request to revise Yacolt's UGA to include parcels owned by Drew Uskoski, Lyle and Christine Uskoski, James Lindberg, Earl Jackson, Peter Jackson, and Dennis Stephenson is not only premature but also detrimental to the current residents and local agriculture. Here are the key reasons why this zoning change should be denied:

- Preservation of Agricultural Land: Our family farm, along with others in the area, relies on the integrity of the

surrounding agricultural land. The proposed development threatens to erode the agricultural base of our community, leading to loss of farmland, increased land prices, and potential displacement of local farmers.

- Environmental Impact: The introduction of significant urban development into this rural area will have adverse effects on local ecosystems, including increased runoff, potential water contamination, and loss of wildlife habitats. These changes will harm the natural beauty and environmental health of Yacolt.
- Infrastructure Strain: The existing infrastructure in Yacolt is not equipped to handle the influx of new residents and increased traffic that such a development would bring.
