My name is Monica Zazueta Tabor and I am a concerned mum who just completed work as a member of both the Clark County Climate Community Advisory Group and the Environmental Justice Coalition. I urge you to pass the Amended Resolution to the Comp Plan DEIS as drafted.

As we discuss these crucial urban land use policies, it is essential to highlight the responsibilities that the County holds under the Growth Management Act (GMA). We must shift our mindset to understand why their perspectives are essential in our planning and decision-making processes. Healing and reparations are crucial to ensure that we are not merely utilizing indigenous and people of color knowledge but genuinely valuing their contributions and fostering an inclusive environment.

My ask,

Please pass Clark County RESOLUTION NO. 2025-04-xx AS IS, which would omit options from the Comp Plan DEIS that would require the de-designation of resource lands or surface mining overlay designations, as well as discontinue the countywide resource lands study.

By prioritizing compact, sustainable practices that align with the principles of the GMA and the recommendations of the EJC and the CAG, we can pave the way for a resilient and climate-conscious Clark County.

Thank you once again for your attention to this pressing matter. I am eager to see our community take bold steps toward a sustainable future where every human being will thrive within the means of our living planetary boundaries.
