Hello,

I spent some months in Northern Virginia last year and hiked regularly at a place that might be an innovative solution for planning in Clark County.

The place is called the Leopold Preserve. As I understand it, 700 acres - former farm land- were planned for a housing development. Instead of using 700 acres for housing, they used just 200 acres for the housing development. The other 500 acres were developed into a nature preserve - compete with well-marked trails and interpretive signs explaining the natural and cultural history of the site. Wetlands were kept as wetlands, obviating the need for mitigation and expensive habitat alterations. A full-time park ranger maintains the site and it is open to the general public- though signs direct visitors away from the housing development. There is a parking area for visitors complete with a restroom. I spoke with the ranger and the site is relatively trouble-free.
