Dear Commissioners,

Fourth Plain Forward strongly supports the coalition letter and the inclusion of explicit references to race in the climate element of the Comprehensive Plan.

As an organization rooted in the Fourth Plain Corridor, the most systemically disadvantaged area of Clark County, we witness daily how historic redlining, racial covenants, and siting decisions continue to shape unequal health outcomes, housing access, and exposure to environmental harm. Excluding race from the Comprehensive Plan would erase these realities and weaken the County's ability to craft targeted, effective policy. Equity requires precision, and precision requires naming race.

Clark County has already invested in an inclusive process by convening the Climate Advisory Group and Environmental Justice Council. To strip race from their recommendations now would undermine the credibility of that process and signal to communities of color that their lived experiences are still not being heard.

It is also important to recognize the policy and funding context in Washington State. The Climate Commitment Act and the HEAL Act require agencies and local governments to identify and prioritize disproportionately impacted populations, which includes race and ethnicity. The Covenant Homeownership Act likewise codifies the impacts of historic racial discrimination into state law. If Clark County's Comprehensive Plan removes race, it risks falling out of alignment with these requirements. That misalignment could not only reduce trust locally but also jeopardize the County's eligibility for state-directed climate and housing funds.

This is a moment for leadership. Including race in the Comprehensive Plan demonstrates honesty about history, accountability to current disparities, and readiness to build a healthier, more resilient future for all residents. It also ensures Clark County remains aligned with Washington's equity standards, positioning the County for the resources needed to implement its climate goals.

We urge you to adopt the climate element with race explicitly acknowledged. Doing so honors the work of the CAG and EJC, respects state law, and upholds the County's responsibility to the communities most affected by climate change and environmental injustice.
